Evaluation of 2006 Conference

- 4. Commission paper HSC 06-74 detailed the aims and objectives and supporting arrangements for the HSC's 2006 Stakeholder Conference. Objectives included:
 - Building and maintaining productive relations with our key stakeholders including leaders from business, public sector, trade union and professional bodies;
 - Helping define the work we need to undertake with our key stakeholders to build awareness, understanding and support for the Government's Health, Work and Well-Being Strategy and agree the actions we will take forward in partnership with our stakeholders;
 - Promote the "Good jobs, good health" agenda.

A steering group comprising Commissioners Danny Carrigan (chair) and Judith Donovan together with HSE officials was responsible for formulating the programme and planning for the conference.

5. The HSC 2006 Conference attracted 152 external stakeholders excluding HSC/E and speakers. One of the underlying aims was to attract and involve top leaders from business and trade unions in the 'Good jobs, good health' debate. A small number of business leaders attended, including from FTSE 100 companies, but not to the extent we anticipated. There was also a significant number of 'no shows' - some 50 who registered but in the event were unable to attend. We will be following up the 'no shows.'

- Over 60 stakeholders completed and returned evaluation forms.
 - Main findings arising from the evaluation included:
 - (i) 95% of respondents said they found the Conference worthwhile.
 - (ii) 74% of respondents said the conference helped them understand the challenges of health at work in the 21st century and what action could be taken in their organisations.

Comments from delegates included:

- (i) "Very timely and useful. Good to attend an event with such a mixed audience."
- (ii) "Well organised, excellent venue, and relevant speakers."

- (iii) "Very interesting and thought provoking."
- (iv) "Good to see HSC focussing on workplace health."
- 7. Details of the 2006 programme (see Annex 1), the list of attendees (see Annex 2) and evaluation summary (see Annex 3) are attached for information.
- 8. The conference met the objective of helping to develop and build on existing good relations between the Commission and key stakeholders. It is clear from the feedback that a number of those attending the conference greatly appreciated the opportunity to meet and engage with the Commissioners on "Good jobs, good health", the Strategy and other health and safety issues.

This event should be seen in the context of many other events, on a large or smaller scale, happening throughout the year and providing an opportunity for Commissioners to engage with different stakeholders – e.g, speaking at stakeholder conferences Commission annual reception, meetings with Parliamentarians, the Party Conference fringe events and involvement in sector conferences.

The difficulty in arranging Ministerial and external speakers demonstrates the need to have organisational arrangements, as well as agreed themes, in place well before the conference.

- 9. The HSC Chair, in his opening remarks, stressed the importance of teamwork, including Ministers and all our stakeholders, whether medical, management or trade union, to act as a team if we are to meet the challenges of good health and good jobs. He made clear that the Health, Work and Well-Being strategy was designed to tackle these very issues. Central to that strategy is that work is good, because not having work can and does impact detrimentally on health, creates health inequalities and considerably reduces life opportunities. He concluded his opening remarks by stressing the importance of all those attending having a clearer understanding of the issues we need to tackle and the actions the Commission would like stakeholders to work with HSC/E to take forward.
- 10. In summarising the outcomes of the 'Good jobs, good health' conference HSE's Chief Executive made the following points:
 - While much has been achieved in improving workplace safety there remains much to be done – our focus on workplace health should not detract us from our safety goals
 - It is clear from the discussions that health and safety is key to organisational effectiveness good management systems that ensure workplace safety will stand us in better stead in the area of occupational health as well
 - Already a wealth of knowledge exists for example on the design of good jobs we need to use and build on this existing knowledge
 - A wide variety of players have responsibility in taking the good jobs, good health agenda forward
 - Clear need to segregate actions which need to be undertaken at the individual level, the organisational level and the national level. We need to ensure stakeholders

- complement one another in taking the strategy forward rather than doing too much or too little
- Good co-ordination between stakeholders is essential to get the balance right and help us move forward in a synchronised way – we need to carefully consider how best to achieve this goal

Costs and Benefits

- 13. Costs for 2006 Conference are attached (see Annex 4). This is totalled at £50k. Costs for 2005 Conference were £62.5k. The main reasons for the difference are:
 - a) Facilitation by Commissioners in place of external facilitator
 - b) All choreography and script produced by internal CDS team instead of facilitator
 - c) Less AV equipment in workshops
 - d) Stats launch not linked to the 2006 conference
 - e) Financial saving was offset by pressure on internal team and risk to project

Evaluation of HSC Commission Stakeholder Conference

Summary

The 64 evaluation forms returned from the Conference have been analysed. (Delegates 203)

- **90%** of delegates found the Conference worthwhile. 5% did not indicate on their forms either way.
- 74% of delegates said the conference helped them understand better the challenges of health at work and what action could be taken in their organisation. 12% of delegates did not indicate on their forms.
- **91%** of delegates found they had adequate opportunity to put their views across during the workshops.
- 80% of delegates commented that they thought the debate aided their understanding of issues around health at work and perception of different stakeholders, they graded this between fair and excellent.
- When asked if they thought the workshop they attended addressed the question successfully, response was:
 - Workshop 1 **78%** said yes
 - Workshop 2 **75%** said yes
 - Workshop 3 71% said yes
- 90% of delegates said the practical arrangements during the conference were good/ excellent.
- Did the debate aide your understanding of issues around health at work and perception of different stakeholders?
 - Excellent –15%
 - Good 34%
 - Fair –32%
 - Poor 14%
 - Not indicated 5%

There were a wide range of comments and suggestions on the Conference: e.g:-

- a) "Very timely and useful. Good to attend an event with such a mixed audience."
- b) "Excellent. I personally am very pleased to see workplace health/ mental health high up on the agenda.

- c) "Questions not stretching enough for debate causing too much by way of similar views."
- d) "Great for business, but a need to engage small businesses."
- e) "Food for thought -employer of 17 builders but keen to get involved."
- f) "Excellent –need to ensure and advance the role, involvement of trade unions and the trade union safety representative soon to be re-named health and safety representatives.
- Are there other topics, which you would like to see in future HSC/ E conferences?

Some of the suggestions were:-

- a) Business benefits of implementing healthy workplace solutions.
- b) Overview new legislation and interpretation for work.
- c) Opportunity to get stakeholders to develop "Action plans" for health at work, using experience and best practise examples of the stakeholders
- d) Evidence of impact of improved health and safety on business / organisational "bottom lines" e.g. productivity, profit etc..
