ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON TOXIC SUBSTANCES

Refractory Ceramic Fibres

Paper cleared by John Thompson

Issue

1. Establishment of occupational exposure limits for refractory ceramic fibres. Report back from the consultation exercise.

Timing

2. Routine. The limit will not be published until after the new framework for occupational exposure limits is established in Autumn 2004.

Recommendation

3. That ACTS agrees that the Health and Safety Commission be asked to agree the following Maximum Exposure Limit:

Refractory Ceramic Fibres (RCFs) 1 fibre per millilitre (f/ml) (8-hr TWA) and Special Purpose Fibres*

* defined as man-made vitreous (silicate) fibres with random orientation with alkaline oxide and alkali earth oxide (Na₂0+K₂O+CaO+MgO+BaO) content less or equal to 18% by weight.

This limit is likely to be published as a Workplace Exposure Limit, subject to the agreement of ACTS and the HSC to the new occupational exposure limit framework.

Background

4. In November 2002 ACTS agreed that consultation should go ahead on the establishment of a maximum exposure limit (MEL) for RCFs and Special Purpose Fibres (ACTS/45/2002). It was agreed that this consultation should ask consultees' opinion as to whether the MEL should be set at either 1 f/ml or at 0.5 f/ml (8-hour TWA).

- 5. A Consultative Document containing these two proposal, and an additional proposal for a MEL for subtilisins, was published on 2 June 2003 (CD 187) with a consultation period lasting until 1 September 2003. A list of bodies and individuals consulted directly is attached at Annex 1. The Consultative Document was also placed on the HSE's website.
- 6. This ACTS paper reports only on the results of the consultation as regards RCFs. HSE is not yet in a position to report back fully on the issue of a limit for subtilisins. The delay over a final position on subtilisins has been caused by the need to carry out further sampling of subtilisin exposure, and to consult further with the industry most affected by the proposed new limit. A report on the outcome of the subtilisins consultation will be presented at the July ACTS meeting.

Argument

- 7. 25 comments were received altogether on the Consultative Document, of which 5 were "no comment". Of the 20 substantive comments, 5 dealt solely with RCFs and 7 dealt with both substances (8 dealt solely with subtilisins). A list of those commenting on RCFs is attached at Annex 2.
- 8. On the recommendation of ACTS, HSC consulted on two options for a limit for RCFs a MEL set at either 1 fibre/millilitre (f/ml) or 0.5 f/ml. Those comments received from bodies representing industry opted for the higher limit, while those representing Trade Union interests opted for the lower limit. One independent consultee, however, commented that that there was no proven scientific benefit in having a limit set at the lower level. Given that certain industry sectors would have considerable difficulty in complying with a limit set at 0.5 f/ml, HSE was satisfied that it was appropriate to set the limit at 1 f/ml. HSE therefore recommends that ACTS agrees to a limit being set at 1 f/ml.
- 9. Few consultees commented on the question of whether or not to retain the gravimetric limit for RCFs (currently set at 5 mg.m⁻³), and comments were equally balanced in terms of retention or removal. In view of the small response, HSE proposes that the limit be retained in its current form, as there are certain circumstances where it would be applied in place of the more common fibres-in-air limit.

Communication Plan

10. The new limit will be publicised as part of the information provided on the new Occupational Exposure Limit framework (ref: ACTS/04/2004). HSE does not expect that this framework will be fully in place until late-2004, at which time the new limit for RCFs will come into force.

Evaluation Plan

11. There are no plans to evaluate the new limit.

Relevant Control Systems

12. Not applicable.

Consultation

Costs and Benefits

15. These were fully considered in the Regulatory Impact Assessment conducted prior to consultation.

Environmental implications

European implications

17. None. The new limit for RCFs reflects its European classification as a Category 2 carcinogen.

Devolution

18. Not applicable.

Other implications

19. HSE is considering the continuing validity of the existing MEL/WEL for machine-made mineral fibres (MMMF). This will need to be re-defined following the establishment of a separate MEL/WEL for RCFs, and HSE intends to look closely at the need for its continued existence. MMMF has already been identified as one of the 15 existing MELs that are due to be reviewed under the new occupational exposure limit framework. In the short term the published MEL/WEL for MMMF will be published as follows:

MMMF (Machine-made mineral fibre) (except for Refractory Ceramic Fibres and Special Purpose Fibres) *

2 fibres/millilitre (8-hour TWA)

- *defined as man-made vitreous (silicate) fibres with random orientation with alkaline oxide and alkali earth oxide (Na₂0+K₂O+CaO+MgO+BaO) content greater than 18% by weight.
- 20. The relevant section of EH40, which describes the existing definitions and controls for MMMF, will be rewritten to take account of these changes.

Action

21.ACTS is requested to agree that a paper be submitted to the Health and Safety Commission seeking its agreement to the establishment of the following Maximum/Workplace Exposure Limit:

Refractory Ceramic Fibres and Special Purpose Fibres*:

1 fibre/millilitre (8-hour TWA)

*defined as man-made vitreous (silicate) fibres with random orientation with alkaline oxide and alkali earth oxide (Na₂0+K₂O+CaO+MgO+BaO) content less or equal to 18% by weight.
