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5	MAKING A DIFFERENCE 2008-2011 – PROGRESS REPORTS			
5.1	Objective 1 – Accident Rates Andy Braund reported that the trend over 10 years showed continuous improvement. In recent years the figure had dropped dramatically largely in part to the work of the recovered paper sector.	-	-	-
5.2	Objective 2 – Benchmarking Safety Management Systems 19 companies had provided benchmarking reports. This covered 50 sites.	-	-	-
5.3	Objective 3 - Benchmarking Health and Safety Climate	-	-	-
5.4	Objective 4 – Occupation Health CPI issued the PABIAC Occupational health benchmarking tool and had 19 responses, most said they only had a policy in place. It was found that they often didn't involve occupational health professionals in carrying out risk assessments.	-	-	-
5.6	Objective 5 – Placing and Securing Loads on Lorries. CPI had recently had a working group meeting which Nina Day (HSL) attended. They came up with three or four solutions for transporting products but still had work to do on tissue. They hoped eventually to produce a solution information sheet for the industry.	-	-	-
5.7	The Chair thanked Mr Braund for his progress report and asked if he thought PABIAC was on course to reach its objectives – Mr Brand thought broadly they were but he would be able to get a better idea towards the end of the year.	-	-	-
5.8	Trevor Dean (Recycling Association) reporting from the recycling industry had improved. The Association website had been updated with health and safety information and members were being encouraged to sign up to the PABIAC Pledge. This had been difficult to get them to see the benefits of this however, this was improving. Guidance on Occupational Health had been put on the website and discussion held with a couple of members on what this meant to them. Site guidelines on changing equipment had been put	-	-	-

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	together and it was hoped that this document would be on the website in August. Small member companies were being encouraged to do annual Health and safety audits with outside professionals.			
5.9	<p>Bud Hudspith (UNITE) – Thought that Mr Braund’s survey was helpful but he believed that the area of ill health caused by work was still a problem. The Unite/CPI ‘Say Yes Say No’ campaign had only got to about half of the industry therefore a possible re-launch was being considered. The campaign was presented to Corrugated sector Safety Reps to remind them and every opportunity will be taken to raise the campaign to individual groups.
